Phyllis Green — Drawing with Light By Marissa Veldman

A snapshot marks a second in time; an event that spreads both inwards to our private realm of association and outwards, to join the vast world of photographic images.

Phyllis Green's philosophy is that the picture finds the artist. A self-taught photographer, she views her surroundings as a narrative and believes she is granted only the sporadic privilege of capturing pieces of time. Each of her photographs is unique: she uses an old Canon camera and makes a single, full-frame print of every negative which is hand printed on fibre-based paper.

"As I work in publications and have no control over the number of copies of my work, I made a conscious decision to have utter control of my art. Photography is my passion and I find the creation of a one-off photograph extremely satisfying."

The artist's efforts evoke documentary realism but her forceful images are deceptively plain; as seen through her lens, everyday objects and places turn out to be wrapped in secrecy. The element of available illumination plays a

vital role in her art—using only natural light, she often has no more than a few minutes in which to grasp the moment and create an image of an object or idea that fascinates her.

She has an abiding connection with our continent. Her depictions of the environment explore the interconnection between civilization and the natural world, thereby drawing us into the perpetual dialogue between disintegration and continuation.

She considers her camera work as a means of preserving personal memories as well as being a documentary analysis of our culture and surroundings. Working within the limits of black-and-white photography, she deftly illustrates our individual and collective responses to living here and now.


Green's work demonstrates an inner vision based on empathy and an intuitive, hands-on approach: it reveals a vulnerability that stands in direct opposition to consumer-driven images that often overwhelm viewers with dramatic representations in technicolour.















